Te Matapihi – He Tirohanga Mō Te Iwi Trust

Te Matapihi operates as an independent voice for the Māori housing sector and was officially launched as the National Peak Body for Māori housing at the watershed 2012 National Māori Housing Conference in Waitangi. Te Matapihi provides systems advocacy to promote Māori led housing solutions. One of the organisation's most recent projects includes partnering with Te Tūāpapa Kura Kāinga to produce Te Aho Tāhuhu, a webinar series providing whānau, and iwi, as well as current and aspiring community housing providers with valuable information about successfully engaging the \$400 million Progressive Home Ownership Fund. Te Tūāpapa Kura Kāinga – Ministry of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

leads New Zealand's housing and urban development work programme. HUD is responsible for strategy, policy, funding, monitoring and regulation of Aotearoa New Zealand's housing and urban development system.

As part of this work, HUD leads the Progressive Home Ownership (PHO) Fund, a \$400 million investment that is creating more opportunities for independent home ownership for people who can't afford to purchase their own home at current house prices.

HUD has partnered with Te Matapihi to produce a webinar series to help whānau, iwi and providers access PHO funding and support individuals, families and whānau to step into home ownership.

Kāinga Ora

Kāinga Ora brings together the people, capabilities and resources of the KiwiBuild Unit, Housing New Zealand and its development subsidiary HLC. This is designed to enable a more cohesive, joined-up approach to delivering the Government's priorities for housing, such as homelessness and making homes more affordable. First Home Partner is a shared ownership scheme to increase home affordability for first-home buyers and Kāinga Ora has contributed valuable information regarding this scheme for both whānau and providers, through the Te Aho Tāhuhu webinar series.



Te Kooti Whenua Māori

Te Kooti Whenua Māori is a Court of Record. Te Ture Whenua Māori Act 1993 (our Act) recognises the significance of Māori land as a taonga tuku iho of special significance, and our role is to provide a Court service for owners of Māori land, their whānau and their hapū which:

- promotes the retention and use of Māori land
- facilitates the occupation, development and use of that land.

Te Puni Kōkiri

Te Puni Kōkiri is the Government's principal policy advisor on Māori wellbeing and development. Housing is a sub-category of Te Puni Kōkiri's strategic priority of Māori economic resilience and includes working with partner agencies to ensure whānau have access to healthy homes with stable tenure as well as opportunities for home ownership and investment. Te Puni Kōkiri has been an active collaborator within the Te Aho Tāhuhu webinar series and provided transparent and valuable information to both providers and whānau regarding how Progressive Home Ownership can benefit Māori and create affordable housing for whānau.



Community Housing Aotearoa

Community Housing Aotearoa (CHA) is a peak body for Aotearoa's community housing sector and has a vision to make sure every New Zealander is well-housed in a warm, safe, dry and affordable homes. CHA works to support the growth and development of community housing providers to enable them to provide affordable and social housing and has been an active and valued collaborator within the Te Aho Tāhuhu webinar series in providing both whānau and providers with insight on how to successfully engage the \$400 Progressive Home Ownership Fund.



KiwiBuy New Zealand

KiwiBuy represents established community housing providers experienced in providing genuinely affordable home ownership housing. Four Community Housing Providers united to found KiwiBuy in 2018 to help address New Zealand's housing crisis. More providers have since joined in support and delivery of Progressive Home Ownership. KiwiBuy is a valued collaborator within the Te Aho Tāhuhu project and has made invaluable contributions to the Te Aho Tāhuhu webinar series for both current and aspiring providers who aim to bring more whānau into safe, warm, and dry homes.
